
# CELEBRATE JOHN LEWIS: GOOD TROUBLE

  - o Timeline: Now-November
- 1 member to coordinate distribution of the guides (most guides will be distributed to libraries in our 3-county area, much less emphasis on various business locations)
  - o Timeline: October-Election Day

## ABSENTEE VOTING FOR AUGUST $6^{TH}$ PRIMARY

Absentee voting started Tuesday, June 25<sup>th</sup> for those eligible voters who are unable to go to their regular polling place on August 6<sup>th</sup> for the General Primary Election. In Greene County, the August ballot includes a wide variety of candidates for county, state, and federal offices, as well as issues in one fire protection district.

Absentee ballots may be voted beginning June 25 until the day before the election. Homebound or out-of-town voters may request an absentee ballot by mail, either handwritten or from the fillable form. These requests must be signed by the voters and received in the Clerk's Office no later than 5:00 p.m. on the second Wednesday prior to the election, July 24th.

Mailed ballots must be voted, notarized, returned by mail, and received in the Clerk's Office before 7:00 p.m. on Election Day.
