VOTER SERVICES COMMITTEE UPDATE

Voter registration events are being scheduled for the 2025 Election season. League registrars who are up to date with their registrar training (Greene County) and/or have participated in the League DEI/Non-partisan training will be receiving emails from me about the registration opportunities coming up. Except for the Municipal Election on April 8 there is nothing on the calendar as far as the August or November elections are concerned. However, this does not mean that something won't come up. So, we need to be vigilant in our efforts to provide registration and voter education opportunities whenever and wherever we can.

The unit meetings scheduled for February 17 and February 18 have been rescheduled for a General Meeting on February 15 at Empower: Abilities. This is going to be an advocacy program along the lines of "Demystifying the Legislative Process". You will have an opportunity to hear about legislative bills related to the priority issues that are important to League members. It's important to hear about the good, the bad, and the really bad bills being introduced in our legislature. And it's time to let our legislators know our concerns.

EDUCATION COMMITTEE UPDATE

The next Education Committee meeting will be Wed., Feb. 12, 1:00-2:00, at the Brentwood Library. Last year our committee's primary focus was the rise in censorship challenges (national and local) and the threats to libraries as institutions of democracy. We realize that the LWV's

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current policies on Individual Liberties and Citizen's Right to Know already make it possible for league members to oppose book banning and censorship; however, our committee is recommending the state league adopt a censorship policy (via concurrence) in June when the *Guide to State Action* policies are updated.

This coming year, our committee's focus will be on the protection of public schools, and we will be closely monitoring what changes are being proposed for our state. The voucher policies that have been pushed forward in several states are a preview to what could be in store for Missouri if citizens do not monitor the process. We recommend that league members pay attention to articles concerning vouchers in other states. For instance, this multi-year study of vouchers from a Michigan professor determined that 75% of voucher funds go to students already attending private schools. Follow the above link to read more! Voucher programs may have positive sounding names when they are introduced, but they usually amount to a decline in funding and services for public schools.

FEDERAL JUDICIARY STUDY

At the 2024 LWVUS Convention, Leagues agreed to conduct a new national study on the Federal Judiciary. The study will be completed in a shortened time frame - conducted in just one year, with the final position set to be announced at LWVUS Council in June 2025. The scope of this study is to:

- To develop a LWV position on the Federal Judiciary as an essential component of US democracy.
- The study's purpose includes, but is not limited to, addressing concerns and clarifying judicial accountability, transparency, independence, and ethics.

The scope addresses the Supreme Court as well as the other Article III federal courts. You can find more information regarding this Study here including timeline, previous webinars/slides, and resources. In February, local Leagues will be sent consensus questions that each local League needs to submit back to the Study. THE RECENT RISE OF ANTI-VOTER LITIGATION

Election litigation leading up to and in the aftermath of presidential elections is nothing new. Many Americans distinctly remember the knife's-edge 2000 election, which resulted in the pivotal United States Supreme Court case *Bush v. Gore*. During and after the 2000 election, 196 election-related lawsuits were filed. More than double that were filed during the 2020 Election following candidate Donald Trump's baseless claims of election fraud.

The 2024 election was no exception, with multiple election lawsuits filed in the days, weeks, and months leading up to November 5. But, distinctly, many antivoter lawsuits were filed that sought to disrupt election administration and purge eligible voters from the rolls.

The League of Women Voters of the United States (LWVUS) monitored these eleventh-hour anti-voter lawsuits, including the substantial amount of <u>voter purge lawsuits</u>. This blog will explore how many of these lawsuits were filed and how they impacted the election.
